HEILSGESCHICHTE (SALVATION HISTORY) SUBJECT OF SPRING SEMINAR

Twenty-four credentialed members of Allegheny Mennonite Conference gathered at Laurelville Mennonite Church Center from May 14-17 to participate in classes led by Marion Bontrager. The topic was Heilsgeschichte or Salvation History. This is the central organizing theme of Hesston College's course called Biblical Literature that has been developed over the past 30 years under Marion's leadership. This course is highly appreciated at Hesston. Several of the pastors who were in attendance had already taken this course, but returning to the topic was welcomed by them.

"I am grateful to Marion Bontrager for spending four days with pastors from across Allegheny Mennonite Conference," stated Donna Mast, Conference Minister. "He has touched the lives of hundreds of Hesston students as they've studied the history of God's salvation story. We were given a glimpse of the richness of this study that Marion has developed over the years. Our morning meditation times were made very meaningful as several pastors shared their personal stories of salvation, connecting to the broader story."

"Marion made a number of points which are important for all of us who aim to live from the Bible," observed Daniel Hertzler. "The Bible is a story. It is our story. To keep it in focus we need a few "pegs", a point he illustrated at the beginning by attempting to hang his cap where there were no pegs. For me it was a good reminder that without some historical understanding the Bible can be confusing, especially since in preaching and teaching we generally take it in small sections."



This year, Laurelville Mennonite Church Center graciously allowed the group to move from the cottages, where this event has typically been held, to the Lodge, giving space to move around the tables and more easily relax during free times. Attendees overwhelmingly stated that this was a great move and hope that the Lodge will be the venue for the Spring Seminar in the years ahead.

Keith Yoder, pastor at Kaufman Mennonite Church reflected, "I thoroughly enjoyed the Pastor's week at Laurelville. It was great to have Marion Bontrager lead our study. He brings such insight and wisdom to the table. I enjoyed studying the Bible (Heilsgeschichte) in a missional

way which focused on God's life-changing plan for his people."

Spring Seminar is an annual event. Next year it will be held April 29-May 2, 2013. Duane Yoder, pastor at Lindale Mennonite Church, Linville, Va., will be teaching from the Gospel of John. "It is a great time for pastors to be resourced, refreshed, and to be reconnected to other pastors across Allegheny Mennonite Conference. I hope that even more pastors will be able to attend next year's Spring Seminar," Donna Mast encouraged.

A Community Yard Sale was hosted by Stahl Mennonite Church Saturday, June 16th to support the Bhutanese Nepali Church of Pittsburgh. Donations were received from the Mennonite churches of the Johnstown region, and the Stahl community provided baked goods in addition to organizing the sale. The amount raised in support of the Bhutanese Nepali Church was \$753.66.

Garage sale goers were there bright and early to shop (shopping even before the sale was opened). Most items were sold as a "free will donation" – allowing customers to set the price and donate whatever amount they desired. Many shoppers were very excited to learn about the Bhuthanese Nepali Church and as a result support their community.

Lauren Brown of Stahl Mennonite shared, "I am so overwhelmed by the generosity of people- both those who donated and shopped. My personal goal was to raise \$300-\$500. The sale's success is just another reminder that God is bigger than the boxes we sometimes put Him in."

The remainder of the unsold goods were then donated to local thrift stores – St. Francis Sharing and Caring Thrift Shop, Wiggles and Giggles, and World's Attic in support of their individual outreaches.

Meghan Good served as keynote speaker for the biennial Women in Conversation retreats hosted by Mennonite Women USA and Laurelville Mennonite Church Center this April.

MENNOMEDIA COMPLETES SONG SURVEY

Harrisonburg, Va.— In preparation for the next published Mennonite song collection, MennoMedia, the publishing agency of Mennonite Church USA and Mennonite Church Canada, has recently completed a major song survey of congregations across North America.

Congregations participating from Allegheny Mennonite Conference were Pinto, Barrville, Morgantown Church of the Brethren, Scottdale, and Pittsburgh.

Originally commissioned by the Bi-National Worship Council, this survey will help to inform a committee appointed by MennoMedia and the denominations as they begin to shape the next Mennonite song collection

Begun in September 2011, the nine month survey was completed on May 1, 2012; however, churches had until June 1 to make their final submissions. In order to determine what songs Mennonites were already singing, congregations were asked to submit the songs they sang each week over the survey period, including music from special services and weekly events.

Over the course of the nine month survey, 191 total congregations submitted more than 32,000 song entries. These songs came from 118 different collections. Of those songs, almost 75 percent came from the current Hymnal: A Worship Book and its two supplements Sing the Journey and Sing the Story. Other collections frequently cited included Christian Copyright Licensing International (CCLI), Mennonite Hymnal (1969), and Sing and Rejoice! as well as a significant number of congregations that compile their own collections. Both MC USA and MC Canada had about 26 percent participation from their respective congregations, as well as five Mennonite education institutions from across the country.

Amy Gingerich, director of print media and cochair of the Bi-National Worship Council, said that the committee envisioned this survey as the first step toward a new Mennonite song collection.
